Transformative Journey


The AP Seminar course is an interdisciplinary course designed to promote critical thinking across the school curriculum, and to emphasize skills that students will need to be successful in post-secondary education and in the professional world -- research, critical thinking, argumentation, synthesis, and collaboration. The lens through which this course will be explored is the African Diaspora (in regions of the Americas and Eurasia) and the peoples of the African continent and their migration to Canada. It is structured chronologically and thematically. It centres the African and diasporic experience as exemplary of human experience in general. The course explores the local to the global, tracing patterns, parallels, connections, and transformations in the lives of people of African descent and their arrival in Canada with a focus on world history since the 15th century.

AP SEMINAR LEARNING JOURNEY

A cross-disciplinary course, AP Seminar allows students to delve into academic and real-world issues through the analysis of divergent perspectives. Using an inquiry-based approach, they will read, analyze, and synthesize information from diverse sources, building evidence-based arguments through essays and presentations. The goal is to endow students with precise analytical skills essential for accurate information evaluation and effective communication.

The AP ADC Seminar is designed for Grades 10/11, focusing on independent research, evaluating reliable sources, and constructing persuasive arguments. Through inquiry-based projects centered on real-world issues, students will:



By bridging community organizations with formal education, the AP ADC Seminar empowers youth to take charge of their learning and engage in dialogues on anti-oppression, anti-racism, diversity, and inclusion. Participants gain knowledge of Canada's cultural diversity, develop strategies to address societal issues, and build capacity to take real action against racism and discrimination.
